New metric doesn't reflect school quality, superintendent says

WATCHUNG - Watchung schools did not score exceptionally well in a new state rating system, though Superintendent Barbara Resko says the numbers do not tell the full story.

According to the state Department of Education, the rating system contained in the 2018 School Perfor-

mance Reports for middle schools is based on Partnership for Assessment of Readiness

for College and Careers (PARCC) pro-

ficiency scores, student progress on PARCC tests, and absenteeism.

The system rated all 2,100 New Jersey high schools and middle schools on a scale from 1 to 100. Private and charter schools are not included.

Bayberry School received a positive rating of 75.06, good for the 526th highest score in the state. Valley View School, however, scored a 28.88 rating, 1,479th in the state.

scores are by no means a ranking system.

"While our score did not look that great," Resko said during a Watchung Board of Education meeting at Valley View School on Wednesday, Feb. 7, "we certainly are not a school identified in need of comprehensive support and improvement.'

According to the DOE, Resko emphasized the the summative rating system was created to comply with the federal Every Student Succeeds Act, which replaced the No Child Left Behind Act in 2015.

The system is intended to "build on key areas of progress in recent years, made possible by the efforts of educators, communities, parents, and students across the country," according to
